To every father and to every man who has stepped up to be a father figure, thank you for your example, your sacrifice and your love.



## Don't make your A/C work so hard

Summertime seems to be getting hotter every year. This season, prepare your home in advance so relying more and more on your air conditioning won't show up as much on your electric bill.

Here are five ways to give your A/C a break this summer:

Call an HVAC technician. A professional can examine your system and let you know what needs repairing or replacing, which can prevent a mid-summer breakdown.

Change or clean air filters. When filters do their job properly, they trap dirt, pet hair and anything else that's floating in the air from recirculating into your home when the air conditioner is blowing. But dirty filters can prevent air from flowing, too, which makes the A/C have to work extra hard to cool your house. The solution: Change or clean your filters once a month during the summer.

**Run ceiling fans.** When the A/C is running at the same time as



a ceiling fan, the room where the fan is located will feel cool enough that you can raise the thermostat by about 4 degrees. A fan doesn't cool the air, but it creates a breeze that makes anyone in the room feel cooler.

**Install a dehumidifier.** Another great partner for the A/C is an energy-efficient dehumidifier. Lowering the humidity in your home helps the air conditioner work more

efficiently because it doesn't have to waste energy removing moisture from the air and can concentrate on simply cooling it.

**Don't create heat.** On days when it's warm enough to turn on the air conditioner, turn off your oven, clothes dryer, lamps and other appliances that create heat. Wait until after dark, when the day cools off a bit, before running heat-producing machines.

#### Protect against electrical hazards—

### Know the pool rules

Nothing beats a plunge in a backyard pool on a hot summer day. To ensure you're splish-splashing safely, take the necessary steps to protect against electrical hazards.

Know and follow these pool rules:

- All outdoor receptacles should be GFCI (ground fault circuit interrupter)-protected, covered and dry. Test GFCIs monthly to ensure they are functioning properly.
- All electrical equipment used for the pool, even the cleaning equipment, must be grounded.
- Keep electrical devices and cords at least 10 feet away from water sources.
- Don't handle any device that is connected to a live electrical current while wet or touching wet surfaces. Safer: Use battery-operated appliances.
- Carry long-handled cleaning



tools horizontally and stay at least 10 feet away from power lines.

- Never string electric lights above or near swimming pools.
- Label power switches so they can be turned off quickly in an emergency.
- Watch for flickering lights, which may indicate an electrical failure or

loose connection. Don't go into the water until a licensed electrician checks the problem.

Never go in the water during a thunderstorm.

It can be easy to overlook, but electrical safety is extremely important around water. Remember and abide by the pool rules.



### February 2022 Board Briefs

- Kilowatt-hour sales for the month of December were 11.12% under budget and purchases were 2.16% under budget. The monthly TIER for December was -.84.
- 2021 Financial Review: Revenue was \$1.28 million above budget, Purchase Power was \$1.62M over budget and Operating Expenses were \$1.42M under budget. End of the year TIER was 5.94, an improvement from 2.59 in 2020.
